

 Deliver the Europe 2020 strategy objectives of smart, sustainable and inclusive growth


Focus on results

Reinforcing effectiveness and performance

- Focus on results
 - Common & programme-specific indicators, reporting, monitoring & evaluation
- Performance framework for all programmes
 Clear and measurable milestones and targets
- Performance reserve
 - 5 % of national allocations (by Member State, fund and category of region)
- Ex-ante and ex-post conditionality

 Ensuring conditions for effective investment are in place
- Macro-economic conditionality
 Alignment with broad economic governance



Enhanced strategic approach

Common Strategic Framework

Partnership Contract Operational Programmes

- Comprehensive investment strategy: aligned with Europe 2020 objectives
- Coherence with National Reform Programmes
- Coordination: cohesion policy, rural development, maritime
 & fisheries funds



Concentration of resources - Menu of thematic objectives

- Research & innovation
- Information and communication technologies
- Competitiveness of Small and Medium-sized Enterprises
- Shift towards a low-carbon economy
- Climate change adaptation & risk prevention and management
- Environmental protection & resource efficiency
- Sustainable transport & removing bottlenecks in key network infrastructures
- Employment & supporting labour mobility
- Social inclusion & combating poverty
- Education, skills & lifelong learning
- Institutional capacity building





Concentration of ERDF investments





Reinforcing Territorial Cooperation

- Separate regulation
- Increase of financial resources (+30 %)
- Concentration of programmes on up to 4/5 thematic objectives
- Simplified programme management (merger of managing and certifying authorities)
- Easier creation of European Groupings of Territorial Cooperation (EGTC)







- In the partnership contracts:
 - ✓ Territorial development strategy aligned to Europe 2020 (e.g. smart specialisation)
- In the Operational Programmes:
 - Community-led local development (art. 28-31)
 - ✓ Integrated Territorial Investments (art. 99)
 - ✓ Innovative urban actions (art. 9 ERDF)



Community-Led Local Development (articles 28-31 of the Common Provisions regulation)

- Integrated and multi-sectoral place-based local development strategies focused on sub-regional territories
- Led by local action groups composed of representatives of public and private local socio-economic interests
- Tailored to local needs and potential



Integrated Territorial Investment (article 99 of the Common provisions regulation)

- Tool for implementing territorial development strategies requiring investments under more than one priority axis or operational programme
- Target a designated territory (e.g. specific urban neighbourhoods; multi-regions area; network of small-sized cities)
- Can be implemented by a Managing Authority, or an intermediate body (e.g. local authorities, regional development bodies, NGOs)



Innovative Urban Actions

ERDF will support innovative actions targeting urban areas:

- Focused on sustainable urban development
 At least 5 % of ERDF resources
- Creation of urban development platform
 Networking between cities and exchanges on urban policy
- Pilot projects for sustainable urban development
 Subject to a ceiling of 0.2 % of the annual funding



Contribution from the Research Community

- Need for more robust RESULT indicators able to better capture and quantify the specific needs of specific territories
- More extensive research on the ground is needed:
 - ✓ To accumulate more reliable knowledge of the territories
 - ✓ To better understand the drivers of change in territories.
 - To provide evidence of the added value of the integrated approach
 - ✓ To find out TRENDS that can be generalised.
